WW2 Airfields at Horham, Eye and Thorpe Abbotts

During World War Two the sound of aircraft engines was heard almost every day from 1942 onwards as the Mighty Eighth took off, formed up or came in for landing at the three airfields that surrounded Hoxne.

The airfields at Horham, Eye and Thorpe Abbots were very welcoming to the local communities and many of the Hoxne youngsters found their way to one, or other of these 'little Americas' for parties or just sight-seeing!

Building of the airfields was a wonder of organisation, skill and hard work!
